

What is Oracy?

Oracy is our ability to share ideas, develop understanding and engage with others through speaking and listening. In school, oracy is a powerful tool for learning; by teaching students to become more effective speakers and listeners we empower them to better understand themselves, each other and the world around them. It is also a route to social mobility, empowering all students, not just some, to find their voice to succeed in school and life.

Oracy for our children mean they can achieve academically but also socially and emotionally. They have the vocabulary to form friendships and navigate problems. They can express their feelings and share their thoughts.

Positive life chances increase with effective Oracy skills.

Oracy can also mean non-verbal communication for children with communication needs, such as the use of visuals or hand signals.

Children with good language skills achieve better results in English and Maths¹ and have higher rates of school enjoyment and confidence.²

On leaving school, they are less likely to suffer mental health difficulties and have more job prospects.³

Voice 21 is the UK's oracy education charity. They work with schools to transform the learning and life chances of young people through talk. They campaign for oracy to have a higher status in the education system.

Oracy Framework

The Oracy Framework, devised by Voice 21 and Oracy Cambridge, provides a structure through which teachers and children can understand what is good speaking and listening in different contexts. It breaks down the skills within oracy into four distinct but interlinked strands: physical, linguistic, cognitive and social & emotional.



- Talk Detectives
- Talk tokens
